

## Door Hardware Options

Hardware is both functional and decorative, playing a major role in the look and security of your doors. This guide highlights common hardware styles and finishes available for interior and exterior doors.

### Interior Door Hardware



#### Passage Handles

Passage handles are non-locking door handles used for hallways, closets, and other interior doors where privacy is not required.



#### Privacy Handles

Privacy handles include a simple locking mechanism and are typically installed on bedroom and bathroom doors.



#### Dummy Handles

Dummy handles are non-functional decorative handles commonly used on closet doors, pantry doors, or inactive double doors.



#### Entry Handle Sets

Entry handle sets combine a decorative exterior handle with a keyed deadbolt, commonly used on main entry doors.



#### Deadbolts

Deadbolts provide added security by extending a solid bolt into the door frame.



#### Keyed Knobs and Levers

Keyed knobs and levers are locking door handles that require a key from the outside.



#### Smart Locks

Smart locks provide keyless entry using keypads, smart-phones, or smart home systems.

### Hardware Styles



#### Modern Hardware

Characteristics

- Clean, simple lines
- Matte black, chrome, or brushed nickel finishes
- Square or minimal round backplates



#### Traditional Hardware

Characteristics

- Rounded knobs or curved levers
- Decorative detailing
- Often brass, bronze, or antique finishes



#### Transitional

Characteristics

- Mix of modern and traditional elements
- Simple but slightly softened lines
- Very versatile with many home styles



#### Rustic or Decorative Hardware

Characteristics

- Textured or hand-forged appearance
- Iron, oil-rubbed bronze, or distressed finishes
- Often used in farmhouse, craftsman, or rustic homes
